



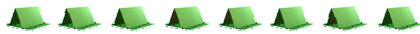

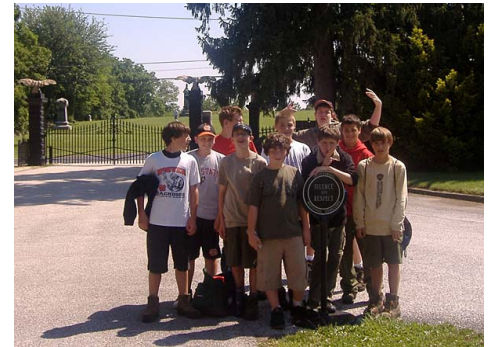

He had a funny accent, but told us about the battle from the South's point of view. It started to

rain, so we went into a barn and waited for the storm to pass. He told us about the soldiers hiding in the barn during the battle. We went to Pizza Hut for dinner and had a fire, back at camp before going to bed.



On Saturday after breakfast, we went to a cemetery. There were a lot of memorials and tombstones there for the Civil War people. We took an auto tour that led us around to different monuments. We went to a house where a cannon ball came through it. Later, we hiked up on Big Round Top and Little Round Top, where cannons were placed during the battle. Across from Little Round Top, was Devil's Den, where the Confederates made the Union army retreat. We took a tour of Devil's Den and saw many big rocks. We left and went back to camp and made a dinner of Jambalaya. That night we went put-put golfing. Put-put was a lot of fun, even watching Alex M. fall in the water. After the 18th hole there was a special shot that if you got a hole in one, you got a free game. Adam P. got a hole in one! Instead of a free game, four of us got to do bumper cars.
